Did you know that...

- > Throughout the world, there are many longitudinal birth surveys similar to *I am, I'll be*?
- > Since we want to stay up to date on best practices, we keep a complete list of these surveys. Just in Canada, there are about 50 such surveys. *I am, I'll be* is the largest birth cohort in Québec!
- > Whether small or large, based in one city or spanning the whole country, these surveys are aimed at better understanding child and youth development. In some cases, this is accomplished by addressing a specific subject, and in other cases, by drawing a broader portrait, as in the *I am, I'll be* survey.
- > All respondents in these surveys, including all of you, help to better understand youth all over the world. You can be proud of yourself!

Vox pop

More and more full-time students aged 15 to 24 have a job during their studies. This proportion rose from 30% at the end of the 1990s to slightly more than 40% in 2012. These students work an average of 15 hours per week. Are you in this situation?
